e. The client's requirements of a living area that could open out an outdoor courtyard has been achieved through the use of large ding doors and glass louvres and dramatically improves the ection between the indoor and outdoor entertaining spaces.

TIP

Sometimes the choices you make for your exterior spaces will have an effect on your interiors. By intercepting sunlight before it strikes window glass, sun louvres such as the Luxalon "Aerobrise 150" used here, dramatically reduce heat gain within a room while, at the same time, eliminating annoying glare. Both benefits add considerably to the comfort of the building's occupants, especially during summer months. The effect of solar radiation on airconditioned buildings can create a heavy demand on the cooling system, which needs to cope with the build-up of long-wave radiant heat. By preventing an increase in temperature caused by direct sunlight, these sun louvres not only reduce energy costs, but they can also even allow smaller, economic, capacity cooling units to be used.
